Belvidere park, Park Place Subdivision, street names




Part was included in 1859 annexation; west part not added to city limits until 1917 making older home research there problematic at times.



Belvidere Park. Streets: (N-S) Peck, Sparrow, Barnes, Smith; (W-E) Beal, Osband, Bradley, Davis, Todd, Coleman, small part of Bank St. near RR tracks. Blocks 18-23 have alleys.


Marion D. and Claire A. Skinner – he was the secretary of the Lansing City Railway (streetcar) in the 1890s.




This plat includes alleys on almost all blocks

Street Names (N-S): "River Drive," Braman, Britten, Sparrow; (W-E) Logan, Fletcher, Stirling, Pico, Delevan, Hess.

Hess – Otto Hess was an engineer and surveyor who happened to do the surveying for this plat.



Built in 1919 according to tax record. First resident was Mrs. Cora Seymour, widow of Burt, a carpenter. They had lived most of their lives in Webberville and he died there in 1918. Some other residents on MRD had the last name Seymour around 1920 and may have been relatives. She died in 1943. Card is from 1963. Note about addition in 1959.



Card from 1953. Built for Junius H. and Anna Hatch. Junius was a clerk in the Auditor General's office at the State of Michigan. He had served in the Civil War and was a member of the G. A. R. He died in 1921. They were both born in New York and had moved to Michigan as young adults. Anna Hatch died in 1922. Very interesting home style – nothing found on that!!




Photo from 1946. "Deluxe Tudor home" from real estate ads. Built for Howard J. and Jessie E. McConkey. He worked for Olds. She was involved in a number of clubs such as the Richardson Embroidery Club, the South Lansing Women's Club, and the Ingham County League of Women Voters.
